He used an empty detergent bottle and lit a cigarette at the top. When asked by sixth grader Michael Llanos, "Mr. Muraoka, aren't you polluting the air by doing that?" Mr. Muraoka replied, "Although it's creating pollution, I'm trying to show 32 children how smoking can be damaging to their lungs." Now, after seeing what smoking could do to their lungs, the students are now convinced that they do not want to smoke and do not want to be around second-hand smoke. Motivating Your Child

Show your elementary schooler the effects of persistence

It's wonderful for kids to be talented and smart, but research shows it's just as important to be persistent.

Pushing forward--even when it's tough--is a key to success. Whether your child is naturally persistent or gives up easily, it helps to:

- Break big goals into small parts. If your child is determined to get an A in math, support him by discussing steps. How exactly will he reach his goal? Help him develop a reasonable plan.
- Enjoy the process. Sure, it feels great to see an A on a report card, but it also feels great to study hard and do well on a test, quiz or project. Even better, it feels great to learn! Talk with your child about his accomplishments and what makes them worthwhile.
- Discuss persistence. How has persistence already helped your child? Maybe he learned to ride a bike or play an instrument. What new challenge can he tackle now?
- Compliment your child's hard work--not just the end results. If he falls short of a goal, that's okay, as long as he tried.

ADVENT WREATH

Each year at this time we prepare our Advent Wreath, a tradition here at The Children's House--a tradition that you may wish to incorporate into your Christmas celebration.

The liturgy of the Advent Wreath and the symbolic lighting of the candles prepares our hearts for the coming of the Christ Child. Lighting the Advent Candles is an old custom. Traditionally, a large wreath was suspended from the ceiling and on each Sunday of Advent a candle was lighted and placed on the wreath. Tradition suggested that three candles are purple, representing our need for forgiveness and longing for the coming Savior. The fourth candle is pink, symbolizing joy--joy at the birth of our Savior. Here at The Children's House we use a table wreath, and we sometimes use four red candles. We add a large white candle in the center to light on Christmas Eve. The wreath is a ring of evergreens symbolizing eternal life.



This is a suggested liturgy....

First Sunday or first week in December

Today is the first Sunday of Advent. It is the season each year for preparing our hearts and homes for the coming of Christmas to celebrate Jesus' birth.

The First Candle is Lighted

As we light our first Advent candle, the Prophets' candle, this candle reminds us of the prophets, those special persons who spoke God's word to the people during the hundreds of years before Jesus was born. The prophets told the people what God was going to do, and they instructed the people on how to get ready. Over and over, the prophets warned the people to obey God. (Reading: Isaiah 9: 2, 6)

Second Sunday or second week in December

Relight the Prophet candle and light the second candle

As we light our second candle, the Bethlehem candle, let us remember Joseph and Mary journeying to Bethlehem searching for a room where they could spend the night. (Reading: Luke 2: 1-7)

Third Sunday or third week in December

Relight the Prophet candle, Bethlehem candle and the third candle

The third candle, the Shepherds' candle, reminds us of what the shepherds did. First the shepherds listened and obeyed the angels even though they were very afraid. Then they saw Jesus and believed. The most important reason why we remember the shepherds and give them a special candle is because of what they did next; they told all that had happened to them. (Reading: Luke 2: 8-18)

Fourth Sunday or fourth week in December

All four candles are lighted

The fourth candle, the angels' candle, reminds us of the angels that appeared to Mary and later to the shepherds. The angels sang songs of praise to God to the shepherds in their fields. (Reading: Luke 2: 10-15)

Christmas Eve

The first four candles are relighted. Then, the Tall Christ Candle is lighted.

The Christ candle out shines all the others for it reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world. Where His light shines, there is no darkness. (Reading : John 1: 4, 5, 14)
